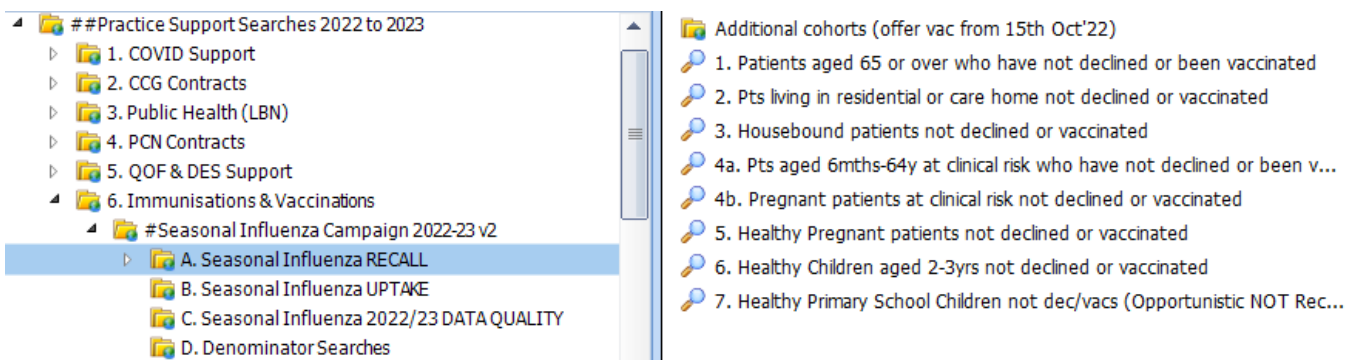


Seasonal Flu Campaign Fact File: 2022-23

This year, as social contact returns to pre-pandemic norms there is likely to be a resurgence in influenza activity in winter 2022 to 2023 to levels similar to, or higher than, before the pandemic. The aim of the NHS flu vaccination programme for the 2022/23 season is to demonstrate a 100% offer and to achieve at least the uptake levels of 2021/22 for each cohort. ¹

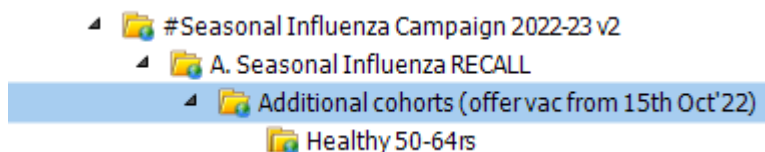

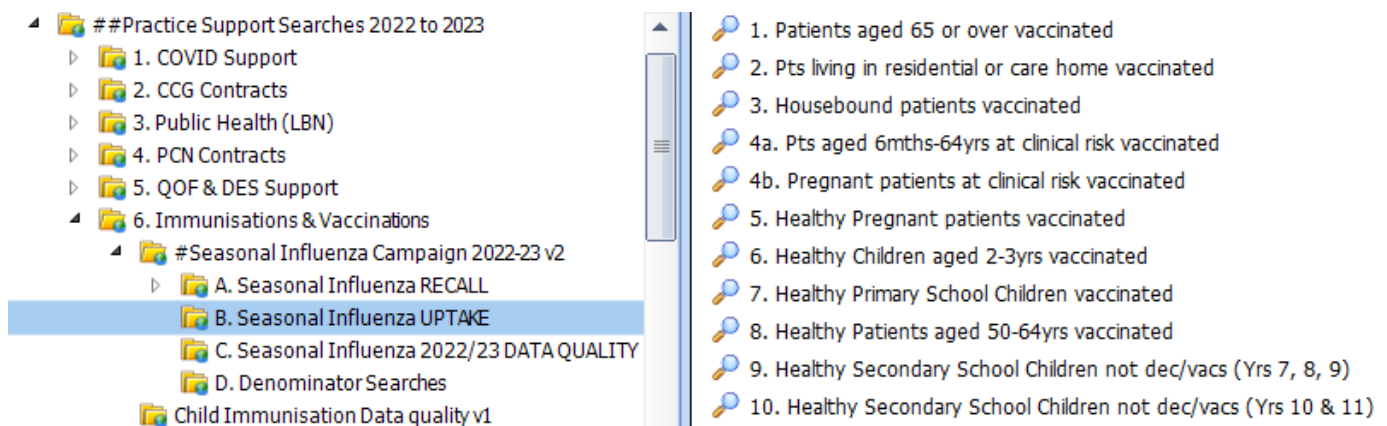


Please note that Healthy Primary School Children not declined or vaccinated will be vaccinated at school and the search is for opportunistic vaccination.

Additional vaccinations: We have prepared a folder for the additional cohort of 'Healthy 50-64 year olds' which commences from 15th October 2022.



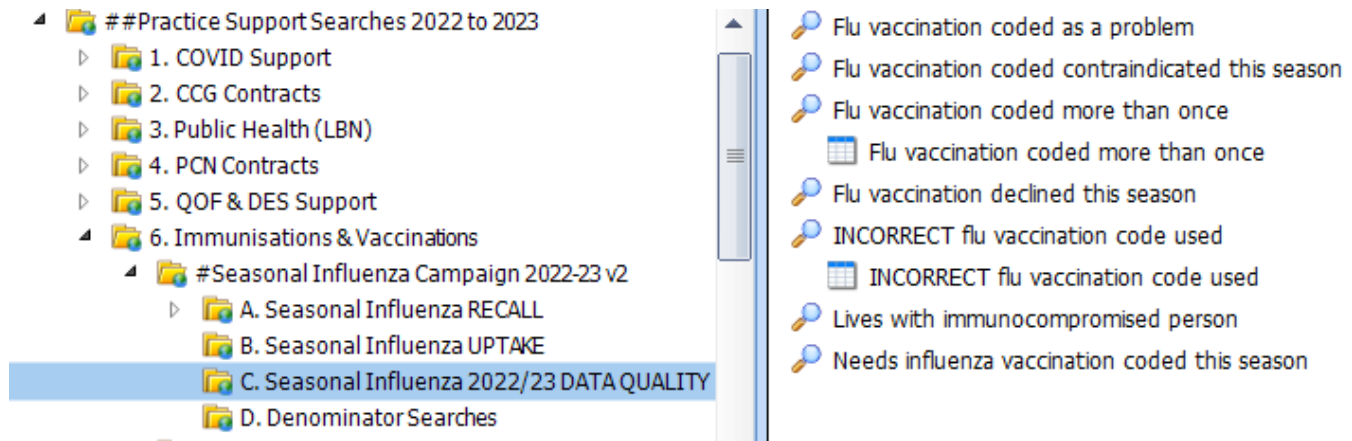
Folder B - Seasonal Influenza UPTAKE shows uptake rates of each of the groups and can be run daily if wanted:

Folder C provides practices with an opportunity to check any data quality issues that may have arisen during data entry ie dupliate data entry/incorrect codes as well as checking the patients that have been coded with 'needs influenza vaccination' this season.

Practices can also check that patients coded with 'lives with immunocompromised person' - 5274100000103 have received or declined vaccination. Vaccinating this cohort will contribute to your overall target and **you will be recompensed for this activity** as these will be picked up by CQRS to ensure payment.



Folder D hosts the eligibility searches should you wish to use them to check a patient's eligibility.

We will also continue to publish a **weekly dashboard** that will indicate uptake rates in each of the groups by practice and PCN.
