

Editorial.

HE new Session at "Bart.'s" begins in a very unobtrusive manner. There is no flourish of trumpets, no pomp and circumstance of an Inaugural Address to mark the commencement of another academic year. We find ourselves once more in the full swing of the Sessional work with nothing except an accession of new students amongst us to remind us that anything important has occurred. We may lose some advertisement by this unostentatious method of getting to work, but we are glad to think that the reputation of our Hospital is such as to need no adventitious puffing by being specially and periodically brought into public prominence.

In keeping with this absence of ceremony, the JOURNAL does not, like some of its contemporaries from other Hospitals, mark the occasion by the issue of any Special Students' Number.
