



This is a place older than Cambridge or Oxford, and more deeply steeped in tradition than either of them. The Hospital still occupies the site where it was first built. We still enter by the Smithfield gate where our founder Rahere entered eight hundred years ago.

"Think," says Sir D'Arcy Power, in a celebrated Abernethian Address, "as you go across the Square of the many generations who have walked across it before you. Patients innumerable, with their friends. some in the deepest grief and anxiety, others rejoicing in their new-found health. Great teachers going to lecture at the College of Physicians or the Barber Surgeons' Hall: now and again a false man like Dr. Lopez, our first physician, going to his traitor's doom at the Tower for plotting to poison Queen Elizabeth. or again a political prisoner like the Governor of Dunkirk who complained that the Sisters emptied their slops under his bedroom window. Think also of those other occupants of the Hospital who were not medical men. and yet lived within its precincts, of Sir Thomas Bodley, the founder of the Bodleian Library, and of Col. Pride on the dull December morning when he started off to ride to Westminster to purge the House. and at Cromwell's command to take 'that bauble' awav."
