	Year 1:
	The coordination of deadlines at the Departmental level is helpful.
	<ul> <li>More assistance is needed in terms of using and accessing Library resources off-campus</li> </ul>
	There is considerable delay in setting up the study groups and, as a result, there is an increasing sense of isolation for many students (also noted at levels 5 and 6).
	<b>Action:</b> KM to address how to use the library in COM4207 (one library session was already held).

#### Year 2:

- It was noted that communication (among students on whatsapp and student-staff via e-mail) is working well.
- From the year group's perspective, there is a sense that more effort should be made for in-person classes at Year 2.
- Some students expressed their concern that there was a certain sense of disparity in terms of student expectations (coursework+ seminar) between Modern Languages and Comparative Literature modules.

**ACTION: Year 2 C**ourse rep to get more specific details about this disparity

#### Year 3:

- The course rep acknowledges improved communication, academic and student support in place this year.
- It was noted that also at Year 3 student whatsapp groups are working very well and are very helpful for the whole year group.
- Research project module (especially the smaller working groups) is going well.

#### **ONLINE LEARNING**

#### Year 1:

- Acknowledged that, overall, QM+ module structure is good and are things easy to find.
- Group work is also working better and people are more comfortable in speaking.

#### Year 2:

- Overall, the online learning experience has been OK. There were some issues with lectures not uploading properly, but these were solved quickly. There is a good range of online resources available.
- Concern was raised over group work: in the current context, it is more difficult to get in touch with people (and some modules encourage group preparation and that's much harder).

# Year 3 It has been noted that QM+ has been better than last year, and that there is a greater ease among students to make the of the online features (e.g. breakout groups). Emphasized how important and helpful it is that things are recorded. • A concern and strong opposition were raised to having cameras on during seminar session. There was an impression that some lecturer's encouragement to have a camera on, was indeed a requirement.
