

- Understand that different people in the community can help us in different ways, at different times.














What's a community?



A community is a group of people who live or work together and help each other. We are all part of different communities, like our school, our neighbourhood, our family, or where we live!

Example: Tower Hamlets



People built houses and shops around the Tower of London and formed a community. Over time, it became known as Tower Hamlets.

Think of it like a small neighbourhood growing around a big, important tower.

Communities are everywhere!

Types of Communities



There are a lot of types of communities: family, school, sports, cultural and local communities.

Communities can form around interests, the area you live in, or the kind of activity you do




Think about who you want to thank in the school or in your local community.
