

British Sign Language

During 2017/18, the School of Geography ran two-weekly one-hour British Sign Language (BSL) classes for students and staff, delivered by Sister Marika Rebicsek (a fully qualified BSL teacher). This was prompted by wanting to enhance communication with a profoundly deaf UG student starting his studies in the School.

<u>Aim</u>

To enhance communication, inclusivity and access in the School of Geography through teaching students and staff BSL; to increase deaf awareness.

Exam success

The classes have been attended by 11 students and one member of staff during the academic year 2018/19. All students who took Unit 101: Introduction: passed, with three students completing an additional Unit 103: BSL at School, College or Work and two students obtaining their full Level 1 certificate.

Sister Marika states:

'It has been an enriching experience not only for the students but myself and my Hearing Dog as we try to bring a little bit of deaf awareness to the campus. Two students passed the full BSL Level 1 qualification in just 40 hours of teaching time (exam board recommends 66 hours!) and it has unearthed some talent too!'
