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What is the Civil Service?

- Over 500,000 people work in the UK Civil Service across the UK
- The five largest departments (Ministry of Justice, Department for Work and Pensions, HM Revenue and Customs, Ministry of Defence and Home Office) account for over two-thirds (68.1%) of the workforce
- Civil Servants have worked on the following recent events:
 - The King's Speech
 - Vaccine Taskforce
 - Commonwealth Games

Different kinds of roles and professions in the Civil Service

Policy development	Programme management	Event delivery and crisis management
Working with the public	Commercial and procurement	Finance
International trade and negotiations	Human resources	Operational delivery

Areas where inclusive language is important in the Civil Service

Policy development – inclusive of all people the policy is affecting Frontline work with the public – working at job centres, border force, vulnerable people, prison offers

Communications – press work, speech writing

Example: Home Office Policy Guidance

Do:

- refer to gender when relevant to how a person identifies, rather than when referring to biological characteristics - for example, if you need this data to understand the needs of users for policing, housing or asylum accommodation purposes
- use gender neutral pronouns for example, 'Alex Brown has settled status, they have the right to live and work in the UK'

Do not:

• use language that reinforces harmful stereotypes and assumptions

Sex Gender

Only ask for sex or gender if a service will not work without this information.

When asking for gender, provide options other than male and female. If you need gender information, ask about sex assigned at birth and gender identity. Tell users why you're asking about sex or gender identity.

Inclusive language by design

Inclusive language builds trust and helps us communicate more clearly
