Research team achievements AY 2022/23

Introduction

As we reflect on our 2-year anniversary (Sept 2023) we would like to outline what we have achieved over the past 12 months. Many of these initiatives came with a steer from the WIPH Research Committee and we are very grateful to the membership of that group for their time and energy. We have highlighted the primary targets for each of these initiatives.



The team delivered thirteen research seminars (+3 on 2021/22) for which the presenters have been a mix of WIPH (69%), QMUL (8%) and external (23%). The seminar series have largely been delivered online, with a few in the hybrid format. The series has been chaired by Belinda Nedjai and supported by Patrick Mullan. The series has not had an active committee throughout 22/23, but this is being revived for AY 23/24. There are plans to move towards a higher proportion of non-WIPH and External speakers for 23/24 now that WIPH is well established and strong connections have been made between Centres.



With significant input from Prof Trevor Sheldon, the team has delivered sessions on three different Fellowship schemes and one surgery. Attendance has been good:

The team completed this series, delivering the following additional sessions:

5. Developing researchers of the future

The team continues to interact directly with the WIPH ECR group mail list, forwarding relevant training opportunities and events. In addition to proactive communications we also continue to support this group with a budget for them to be able to invite external training providers and speakers to their monthly meetings.

In July the team organized the second WIPH Graduate Study Day, held in the Rotblat Lecture Theatre. We responded to feedback from the first year by organising a panel in addition to the student presentations. We invited Alison Thomson (CPN), Georgina Mathlin (CP&MH) and Mohammad Hassannezhad (SEMS) to sit on a panel to which questions were directed from the PhD students around five themes: PhD/Life balance; Dissemination and stakeholder engagement; Writing up; PhD viva; and What to do Post PhD?



The team completed detailed research pages for the staff zone ahead of the launch September 2023 which include Listen and Learn; Research Funding; Seminars, Workshops and Conferences; Pre- and Post-Award Process; Research Design and Development; and Peer Groups and Special Interest Groups. Feedback has been good so far.



The team organised an exchange of interested WIPH and SEMS staff on 31.3 2023. The motivation for this meeting was that rather than reacting to calls it would be good to get ahead of the curve and have begun to establish groups of researchers who want to work together and possible project ideas across SEMS and FMD. The meeting began some interesting conversations and was followed up with a Sharepoint database of SEMS and WIPH researchers to facilitate future collaboration.



The team ran two writing retreats in the AY 22/23 which have each been full to capacity and have had very good feedback. The facilitated retreats are all morning with tea & coffee and lunch provided. Going forwards we plan to run four each year, and based on feedback are also looking at the possibility for extra sessions which are non facilitated but offer a quiet space surrounded by colleagues who are also writing.



The team coordinated the recruitment of the WIPH Academic Lead for Impact, and appointed Charles Marshall in June 2023. Since that time Charlie has, alongside Luke Cridland FMD Impact Officer, has met with nearly every Unit Lead in WIPH to hear about all the ongoing research, identify strong candidates for the impact watch list, and suggest ways in which people might link up with support for help with developing impact.



The team works with FMD Research Strategy Board to introduce activities related to research, either mandated by FMD or recommended by WIPH, as smoothly as possible to ensure that practices are suited to the research which takes place in WIPH.
